

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#### First-year examines rom-com movies

From A Midsummer Night's Dream to Sixteen Candles, audiences have long appreciated the humor of a romantic comedy. But in recent years, true rom-coms have become hard to find. The early 2000s were a rom-com golden age, giving us Miss Congeniality, Legally Blonde, Bridget Jones's Diary, and many more. Post 2010, however, this flood slowed to a trickle, and those that remained shifted slightly. Silver Linings Playbook, for example, follows the traditional rom-com format closely but would fit in poorly with early 2000s rom-coms, given its R rating and harsher tone.

It's important to remember that these early 2000s rom-coms were far from perfect. Some, like Love Actually, are surprisingly sexist when you look closely. With a few exceptions (Saving Face is one) American romcoms from this time featuring characters of color and non-heterosexual couples are almost nonexistent. However, criticisms of the genre too often focus on the idea that rom-coms are inherently frivolous female entertainment, rather than taking the time to consider the flaws and strengths of individual films. This failure of criticism puts us in the uncomfortable position of having to defend the value of romcoms as entertainment and art, while also acknowledging the many ways they fall short.

2017 saw a resurgence of the traditional rom-com with Oscar nominee The Big Sick, but it wasn't until 2018 that the phrase "rom-com renaissance" began to pop up all over Twitter. This June, Netflix released the romantic comedy Set It Up to the enthusiasm of many. Apart from

a slightly more feminist tone and a more diverse cast, the film is nearly identical to an early 2000s rom-com, right down to the NYC setting. Netflix is also responsible for The Kissing Booth, a small-scale disaster in both story and abysmal handling of sexual harassment that somehow found an adoring audience nonetheless.

Thankfully, many of 2018's romcom successes have been more original and progressive. Love, Simon resonated deeply with audiences partially because it marked a departure from the typically heteronormative romcom mold. Two recent releases, To All the Boys I've Loved Before and Crazy Rich Asians, are being celebrated for bringing some much-needed Asian representation into the world of the rom-com. The genre isn't just flourishing—it's changing for the bet-

So the rom-com is back, and it's evolving. Why now? Maybe for the sake of escapism. The world can be terrible, and sometimes we just want to watch people who are prettier than us have love lives that are more exciting than ours. Maybe it's because—as the tagline for Love, Simon put it everyone deserves a great love story, and we're finally seeing more than just cookie-cutter romances in the mainstream. Maybe love stories simply make for good, compelling narratives, and we only search for reasons to justify their popularity because of their lightheartedness. Whatever the cause, the rom-com renaissance is just one more sign that the power of the rom-com should be respected.


